Rural Guided Pathways Project Overview

This is a three-year project with a national cohort of 16 rural community colleges who will work with each other — and with community partners in their regions — to implement the guided pathways framework. The goals of the project are to support participating colleges as they:

- Design and implement a better student experience at their colleges.
- Collaborate with key local stakeholders to increase economic opportunity and partner on a cross-sector approach to implement guided pathways.
- Adopt evidence-based reforms that will address inequities and lead to improved educational and workforce outcomes.

What is innovative about this project?

This project is the first of its kind in two ways:

- Rural focus This is the first time a pathways institute structure is focused specifically on the needs of rural institutions.
- Community partners This is also the first time community partners are deeply embedded in pathways implementation.

Project Professional Development and Support

Each college team will participate in virtual office hours per semester

Virtual Consultancies

Each college team will be invited to two virtual consultancies per semester

Topical Webinars

NCII and its partners will develop and host three topical webinars per year



Institute #2 - Objectives

- Review and analyze institutional program data and identify gaps that exist in program offerings.
- Discuss which student populations are being served by which programs at the institution and which student populations are not in a program at all.
- Identify the equity implications for the current disaggregated program enrollment and completion data.
- Develop an internal communications plan to share the program data with internal stakeholders, including the best framing for the institutional implications of the program data and the next steps for making changes.
- Set the stage for engaging community partners in the conversation about community college programs, alignment with the workforce, existing gaps, and how to collaborate to address those gaps.

Institute #2 - Advance Work

- WHAT: Supported by CCRC, colleges have been asked to submit program enrollment and completion data aggregated by various subgroups.
- WHY: We will use this data to discuss the programs your students are in, what happens to them, and how these outcomes are aligned with (or not) community needs). We will begin this discussion with an internal college dialogue at Institute #2 and broaden the conversation to include community partners at Institute #3 in February.
- WHEN: The advance work should be submitted by <u>October 5, 2022</u>, to Sarah Cale (<u>sarah@ncii-improve.com</u>).
- NEXT STEPS: After we receive your advance work, the CCRC team will examine your college's data and provide high-level suggestions on areas you may want to focus on moving forward. The individualized feedback will be shared leading up to the institute.
