How should colleges be thinking about their redesign efforts? Dr. Ed Massey is the retired president of Aspen Prize-winning Indian River State College (FL). Dr. Massey was at the forefront of institutional innovation and created a culture, systems and structures at IRSC that continue to receive accolades today. He will discuss the IRSC journey implementing pathways and how it evolved into a community approach to student access and success.

1. Ten Years of Research on the Impact of Guided Pathways on the Student Experience

The Community College Research Center will soon release the final report on the impact of Guided Pathways implementation at the original 30 institutions in the AACC project. This report tracks their progress from the start of the project in 2015 until the final data collection last fall. What have we learned? What scaled practices had the greatest impact and what barriers still exist for students?

2. Developing Program Pathways from K-12 into Community College and Beyond

Project Subject Matter Expert Abner Oakes will discuss the importance of extending postsecondary pathways down into K-12 with intentionality, particularly for students who have historically been underrepresented in higher education. Why does that early exposure to programs and careers matter and how can the sectors partner in more innovative ways. Aspen Prize Finalist El Paso Community College is a national leader in the strength of its partnership with the K-12 schools in their service area, including schools in rural settings. Ms. Nelson Rodriguez will talk about their partnerships in detail and how they have evolved as the college has implemented Guided Pathways.

3. Rethinking and Leveraging Employer Relationships with Community Colleges and their Stakeholders

Project Subject Matter Expert Jim Jacobs will talk about innovative models of college/employer partnerships. What role can employers play in providing experiences for students outside of the classroom which increases retention and better aligns their knowledge and skills with what employers need? Dr. Stiles is the Vice President at Aspen Prize-winning Lake Area Technical College in Watertown, SD. She will discuss how the employer community is closely linked to the college and the role those partnerships play in the completion rates of their students.

Priya Chaplot is a national expert on the integration of student financial stability resources into the student experience at postsecondary institutions. She will highlight the importance of making these resources (e.g. food, transportation, child care, mental health, entering programs leading to living-wage jobs and careers) an inescapable part of the student experience and how robust community partnerships can maximize resources for students. Pathways coach, Octavia Lawrence, Interim VP of Student Services at Aspen Prize finalist West Kentucky Community and Technical College, will talk about the college's student financial stability practices and how she thinks those practices can evolve in the future.
