Very often, adult students enter through continuing education or non-credit course taking; we know as a field that very few of those students transition to credit-bearing programs. Most community colleges have not built clear and coherent paths at scale from their non-credit courses and programs. They have also struggled to develop policies and structures for providing prior learning assessment and credit for prior learning. These institutions will provide examples of innovative practices in this area – which has increased the				

	number of students who make the transition from non-credit coursetaking to credit bearing programs.
