Career Outlook...

Uncertain!

65%

of school age students today will likely work in jobs that do not yet exist

47%

of total US employment is at high risk for replacement by computerized automation by 2033

27%

of college graduates work in the field of their major

of businesses indicate they are set to reduce their workforce due to technology integration by 2025


40%

Career Planning Survey Results

Total of 7,081 career planning surveys during the New Student Orientation since April 2023

55.1% of incoming RCC students were Undecided/Uninformed on their major (3,905 of 7,081 students)



Fall 2021 to Fall 2022 Enrolled and in Same Instructional Pathway

Students still enrolled 1 yr. later may change majors, but tend to stay within pathway majors/programs

Does not indicate why unenrolled students left

Instructional Pathway	Percentage in Pathway 1 yr. later
Advanced Technical Arts & Trades	76.3%
Business, Information Systems, & Technology	83.7%
Education & Teacher Preparation	72.5%
Health-Related Sciences	84.2%
Languages & Humanities	66.2%
Social & Behavioral Sciences	73.2%
STEM	68.7%
Visual, Performing, & Creative Arts	79.2%



 - Career not just a job.





California

- **Living Wage, Individual:** \$19.41
- **Living Wage, Family of 4:** \$27.42
- **Minimum Wage:** \$15.00

California's living wage is \$19.41, or \$40,371 a year for an individual. A family of four requires \$27.42, or \$101,378 a year. Childcare costs will cost a family with two working adults \$22,259 a year, slightly more than the \$24,682 they can expect to spend on housing.

Career Integration in the Classroom

Importance of Career Integration

Student needs related to career exploration and readiness:

Access to Knowledge

Provide access to labor market knowledge and know how.

Differentiated Career Guidance

Offer career guidance and exploration opportunities that provide support and growth along their pathway.

Guidance in the Classroom

Provide career guidance that extends into the classroom and is contextualized in disciplinary learning.

Opportunities to Explore

Give students opportunities to cultivate and explore their sociopolitical development across career fields.

OPTION 1: (Examining Concepts)


Mike Rose's article "Blue-Collar Brilliance," discusses how "generalizations about intelligence, work, and social class deeply affect our assumptions about ourselves and each other" (34). This can be true specifically when we discuss the career we are in or are pursuing. One may say that happiness in a job or career is relative.

However, American culture definitely posits certain "standards" that might determine a "good career," even though depending on the perspective, these standards may vary drastically! **How should one define a "good career"? Make sure to justify your definition choice and explain why other definitions did not make your criteria and/or why other definitions may be problematic.**

OPTION 2: (Examining Norms)

In the same article as listed above, Mike Rose further states that when it comes to the working class, "our cultural iconography promotes the muscled arm, sleeve rolled tight against the biceps, but no brightness behind the eye, no image that links hand and brain" (43). **Consider the relationship between blue- and white-collar work. Contrast the particular rules and norms that teach us how to think about each of these two categories.** How is each type of work typically defined? What tasks, skills, or abilities are we told each conventionally involves? And, perhaps most important, how are we taught to value these types of work differently? Are these distinctions fair? Accurate? How or how not?

OPTION 3: (Examining Career & Positionality)

Directions: Think about how bell hooks discusses the intersections of race and class in her text "Learning in the Shadow of Race and Class." Consider the title of her piece. **What are the "shadows" that, according to hooks, most directly affect or shape one's experiences of school and career path?** To what extent do these "shadows" impact a person's life as powerful, unspoken scripts, drawing the lines around particular roles that people in culture are allowed (or not allowed) to play?
